

## No Burning of Yard Waste




Spring weather is already here and this is a friendly reminder that the village has a burning ordinance; residents may NOT dispose of waste by burning it in yards.

Many uneven squares of sidewalk have been observed in the village. These spots will be marked by a village employee in the near future as needing repair and a program will begin this year to fix them. Per village ordinance 12.04.100 "the cost of sidewalks shall be charged to the property."

Options for repairs will be presented to all properties affected once the project gets underway. More information will follow when available.



### Prescription Drug Take Back



The National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day aims to provide a safe, convenient & responsible way to dispose of prescription drugs while also educating the

public about the potential for abuse of medications.

The Village of Oakfield drop box is located in the lobby of the community center building and is available whenever the building is open. Please dump all pills in a Ziploc bag; it is not necessary to keep them in their original bottles. Liquid bottles should be placed in Ziploc bags and sealed to reduce the potential for leaking.

We encourage you to visit our website for specific dates and times on any activities, follow us on Facebook, or stop in and find out what's happening!



### Ordinances

### 6.04.010 Keeping of animals and fowl

- A. No more than three dogs, three cats or a combination of three dogs and cats shall be kept on any premises without the approval of the village board.
- B. No person shall keep, harbor, or raise at any one time more than six rabbits of any age.
- C. No person shall keep, harbor, or raise any poisonous snake.
- D. The species...may not be kept by any person within the village limits...
- 1. Livestock, including all cattle, horses, mules, donkeys, sheep, goats and swine.
- 2. All mink, foxes, skunks, raccoons, ducks, geese, and bees or other wild animals.

#### 6.04.020 Animal waste and removal

- A. No person shall allow or permit any animal owned by the person or under the person's control to defecate or urinate upon the private property of another without the consent of such other property owner.
- B. The owner and person in charge of any...animal shall not permit fecal matter...on any street, alley, sidewalk, right-of-way, or other public property or on any private property, unless...immediately removed...

#### 8.28.020 Public Nuisance Prohibited

- A. A public nuisance is a thing, act, occupation, condition or use of property which shall continue for such length time as to:
- 4. ...interfere with, obstruct, or tend to obstruct or render dangerous for any passage any street...or other public way or the use of public property.
- B. 7. All animals running at large.
- D. Public nuisances affecting peace and safety
- 4. All trees, hedges...or other obstructions which prevent persons driving...from obtaining a clear view of traffic when approaching an intersection or pedestrian crosswalk;
- 5. All limbs of trees which project over and less than seven (7) feet above the surface of a public sidewalk or street...;
- 9. All loud and unnecessary noises.
- c. ...No person shall do construction work or operate any chain saw, lawn mower or any other loud machinery...between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. except for snow removal and emergencies...
- 10. The keeping or harboring of any animal...which by frequent or habitual howling, yelping, barking...or making of other noises shall greatly annoy or disturb a neighborhood or considerable number of persons...

#### 8.28.24 Storing junked, discarded material.

No person shall, for more than 72 hours, store junked or discarded property including automobiles, automobile parts, trucks, tractors, boats...or other unsightly debris...except in an enclosure which houses such property from public view...

# 13.08.040 (L) Connection to stormwater and groundwater drains

- 1. No person shall allow the discharge...into any sanitary sewer, any storm water, surface water, ground water, roof runoff... if no storm sewer is available, in no event shall any such waters be discharged into any sanitary sewer.
- 2. All sump pumps installed for...discharging clear water...shall discharge into a storm sewer, and, if no storm sewer is available, shall discharge into an underground conduit leading to a drainage ditch, drywell or onto the ground at a point which is not less than three feet from the building and is above permanent grade. No sump pump is allowed to flow on or across a public sidewalk.

### 2024 Dog Licenses

Village ordinance 6.08.020 and Wisconsin Statute 174.05 require you to license your dog(s) by April 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. Dogs must be at least 5 months of age and have a current rabies vaccination. Licenses purchased after April 1<sup>st</sup> will be assessed a \$5.00 late fee. For dogs that become 5 months of age during the year or for newly acquired dogs, you are required to purchase a license within 30 days of acquiring such animal (late fee does not apply). The law also applies to renters.

Licenses can be applied for at the Village Office. Please include a SASE if you would like your license mailed to you.

Fees are as follows:

Spayed/Neutered \$5.00 Unaltered Dogs \$10.00

### **History Corner**

### History of the Burns Brothers Drug Store



In 1878, Dr. Jay William Burns and his brother, Thomas Burns Sr., purchased a drug store formerly owned by John Allen Steen on the corner of Main and Booth Streets. It is believed Steen had built this drug

store. Before operating the store, Dr. Burns attended and graduated Rush Medical University of Chicago and worked in Oakfield with Dr. William Moore from 1872 to 1876. The Burns Bros Drug Store sold medicine, paints, and other confectionery items. Dr. Burns was one of the first men to be born in Oakfield in 1845. Additionally, Dr. Burns was a physician and surgeon for Oakfield and the surrounding areas. In the early 1900s, the drug store was known for selling many of the Oakfield postcards often stamped "Burns Bros. Druggists" in the bottom corner. The early post office and telephone office were also housed in this building as it was convenient for travelers arriving at the train station down the road to walk there. After graduating from Madison, Dr. J.W. Burns' son, Walter, worked at the store. Dr. J.W. Burns retired in 1914 and moved to Minnesota, leaving the business with his son, Walter, and brother Thomas. Thomas Burns Jr. returned from out west to help out at the

store after Walter passed away at a young age in 1918. Eventually, Thomas became the sole owner and he sold the building on October 17th, 1934 to Mr. McKnight after 60 years in the Burns name. The building would continue as a drug store and a food store for years until being converted to apartments in the 1970s which remain today.
